Course Description:

This course investigates the art and architecture of the Gothic period in medieval Europe. Throughout the term you will gradually develop a research paper based on

your interests within the field, with the guidance of the professor and your Writing Tutor. There are basically three main streams of material you will work on for the class: the core grounding in the subject from the *Glorious Visions* text, additional perspectives from readings and supplementary material by other scholars, and the progressive stages of research and writing development through the research paper assignment.

The textbook for the class is

Gothic Art: Glorious Visions by Michael Camille available at the PSU Bookstore, Powell's, and countless other venues.

Grading:

Research Paper 50%

(Topic Statement and Preliminary Bibliography 5 pts, Half Draft 12 pts, 2 sets of Peer Feedback 8 pts, final paper 25 pts)

Reading Community Postings (6 points each) 24% Final Exam 26%
