### COURSE GOALS

- Incorporate a significant amount of writing into class through two response papers and a final paper.
- Introduce students to the paradigms (that is, the ways of thinking and communicating) historians use when thinking about the past through a variety of sources and materials through engagement with articles and chapters written by leading historians.
- Introduce students to oral histories and other types of grassroots history documents via use of documentary films, newsreels, film clips, and other media produced in the past or organized by those seeking to understand it.
- See the ways in which Social Movements developed in overlapping ways, shaped one another, and responded to change over time. Rather than seeing the rise of social justice movements in a vacuum we see them develop alongside one another. This is at heart a comparative history course.
