MUS 205 Music Listening 1

Course Description

This course is designed to introduce students to a wide range of vocal and instrumental music, across eras and geographical locales. Students will hone their aural skills and gain a broad perspective on musical styles and works from various musical traditions in Western art music, from Antiquity to the early to mid-Romantic period.

This Course is designed for PSU music majors as a prerequisite for their music history sequence. It is not a survey of music history course. Each musical example is accompanied by brief liner notes that will give composer information and dates that will help put the example into historical perspective. If you are a non-music major and are looking for a survey of music history course, I suggest looking into MUS 301U or 302U. However, If you are not a music major and want to be exposed to a wide range of musical genres, this course is for you.

Within the "Activities and Content" window, located on the home page, are 10 Unit folders. In each unit folder, you will find a Timeline and links to listening examples with a brief description of each. To begin, look through the timeline in each unit folder as you progress to orient yourself to the historic period from which the music examples are drawn, then read the descriptions for each selection before listening to the music example. When you have completed the required work, assess your progress by completing the "Unit Listening Quiz".
