Course Description: This is a course on the economics of money, banking and financial markets. It aims to provide the student with an introduction to the role of financial markets, financial institutions, money and monetary policy in the economy. There are three main components of this course. The first part of the course discusses the role of the financial system in the economy. The second part studies the structure of the Central Bank and the goals and tools of monetary policy. Finally, we cover topics in monetary theory.

Course Outline: The tentative schedule of topics to be covered in this class and the relevant chapters in the book are presented in the table below. The class schedule and reading assignments shown below are subject to change.

Course Activities: Your grade in this class will be based on your performance on the home assignments and the problem sets. The contribution of each of those to your final grade is shown below:

Problem Set 1 (Midterm) covers material from weeks 1-5 and Problem Set 2 (Final) covers materials from weeks 6-10. You will have a workweek to work on these problem sets. Please, no change of the due dates for the problem sets. There will be no "extra credit" work/assignments. Also work individually on these problem sets.
